TARGETED TUTORING:

The Targeted Tutoring program is based on funding received from DET as well as money from the school. This approach aims to target students who may have declined during the remote and flexible period.

To determine the students eligible for Targeted Tutoring, we looked at our reading and mathematics data from 2023 and identified students who were reading below their expected level and students were performing above the expected level in English and Mathematics; these are the students identified as being part of the Targeted Tutoring program.

We are very fortunate to have dedicated staff to run the following programs:

PhOrMeS: PhOrMeS is a program which focuses on word reading, spelling, phonemic awareness and reading fluency. It is designed to teach readers using short and simple phonetic regular words, progressing onto more difficult words as students master initial skills. Spelling is taught together with word reading. Students are taught to spell words by targeting words with the same graphemes, spelling rules and morphological concepts or etymological roots. Phonemic awareness is both integrated when reading, and also during spelling activities. Reading fluency is practiced daily as students progress through the program. We currently have 31 students in Years One, Two, Three and Four participating in the program.

Read and Respond- Read and Respond at Newbury Primary school provides and intensive reading intervention program. Tutors deliver the program using the Direct Instruction model provides sequenced lessons, which are carefully planned to ensure that students receive the structure and practice necessary to become fluent readers and empowered learners. The program offers students the opportunity to develop their vocabulary, writing and comprehension through modeling, guided practice and independent practice. We currently have 125 students in Years Three and Four participating in the program.

Directive Maths – Our Directive Maths program is designed to support students who require further consolidation with mathematical concepts. The program is organised into modules which focus on addition, subtraction, multiplication, division and fractions and decimals. The maths content is broken into small steps and students practice embedding skills, rules and strategies, efficiently and effectively. Tutors work on providing students with direct, explicit instruction to support critical maths skill development sand concepts students need to understand. We currently have 74 students in Year Five participating in the program.

This is a total of 230 students.

NAPLAN:

Each year, students in Year 3 and 5 participate in the National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) as part of the National Assessment Program which is a Federal Government initiative. Students are assessed in conventions of language reading, writing and numeracy.

In 2024, NAPLAN will be held during Term 1 from Wednesday 13th March - Monday 25th March.

BREAKFAST CLUB:

This is held each Friday morning from 8:00am-8:40am and is run by Salvation Army and school staff volunteers. Come along and get a hot and delicious toasted cheese sandwich and a delicious coffee from the coffee van.

END OF TERM FINISHING TIMES:

At the end of each term, Newbury Primary School students will be dismissed early.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PROCEDURES:

All schools are required to have an emergency management plan which includes a variety of processes for handling an emergency. These vary greatly depending on the type of emergency and can include; evacuation offsite, evacuation onsite, lockdown and a zone lock out. We have a practice emergency drills each term to analyse our processes and ensure they are as efficient as they can be. Students have the process explained to them and are supported by the staff throughout the process.

Please note that in the event of the school having to enact one of the emergency management procedures, our number one priority is ensuring that all students are safe as per our duty of care. If you are concerned at any time that your child has been affected by one of these procedures, please let their classroom teacher know so that we can put some additional supports in place.



LEARNING SPECIALISTS:

This year Newbury Primary School has five Learning Specialists who will be out of their classrooms two days per week, to work with staff on a range of areas. Learning Specialists are highly skilled classroom practitioners who continue to spend the majority of their time in the classroom delivering high-quality teaching and learning and have a range of responsibilities related to their expertise, including teaching demonstration lessons, observing and providing feedback to other teachers and facilitating school-based professional learning.

DROPPING OFF AND PICKING UP:

Please practice road safety at all times. It has been reported that a number of cars are double parking, parking on the roundabout or on the curb as well as asking children to cross the road without using our designated school crossings which poses a huge risk for students. Please be mindful of child safety on the roads around the school. Parking inspectors often visit schools and will issue parking infringements to anyone found posing a danger or parking illegally.

BIKES AND SCOOTERS:

At Newbury Primary School, we promote health and fitness and it is terrific to see many students riding their bikes or scooters to school. Please make sure your child is wearing a helmet and that once they enter the school grounds, they walk their bike or scooter in. ABSENCES:

If your child is absent, please call the school number on 8691 6900 and leave a message to explain their absences. All absences must be accounted for.

Students must arrive at school by 9am. Classroom doors are open from 8:50am to allow students time to settle in and get themselves organised, ready to start instruction at 9am. Arriving at school late interrupts student learning and classroom instruction.

EARLY LEAVERS:

Please be aware that students are dismissed at **3:10pm.** We are finding that some students are being picked up just before 3:00pm, which will not be tolerated. Your child should remain at school unless they have an appointment that they need to attend. We also ask that where possible, you make appointments for your child/ren after school hours.

ALL DAY GRAZING:

At Newbury Primary School, we understand that students need food to fuel their brain and that they are hungry during the day. Therefore, we encourage students to bring along healthy snacks that they can munch on in class. Some ideas include: carrot sticks, cheese, rice crackers, fresh or dried fruit, yoghurt or vegetables. Please refrain from providing food that may affect any anaphylactic students. Classes with anaphylactic students will be notified this week.

We will work closely with Service and Therapy Animals Australia to follow the PAWS training model. This model uses the acronym PAWS as it is easy to remember and encompasses the key components of a successful School Therapy Dog program.











Well-trained, confident, happy therapy dogs can be an invaluable resource for supporting the social and emotional learning of students, as well as fostering a sense of community spirit.

BENEFITS OF SCHOOL THERAPY DOGS:

- ✓ Provision of new social connections
- ✓ Develop a greater sense of community
- ✓ Meet social and emotional needs/facilitate a sense of belonging.
- ✓ Context for teaching/instilling whole school values such as empathy, kindness, gratitude, respect etc.
- ✓ Support for school refusal and reluctant learners
- ✓ Academic support: engage and motivate learners with special needs
- ✓ Emotional regulation and stress relief
- ✓ Means for sharing success/achievements and challenges
- ✓ Creates opportunities to develop social skills

We are excited to explore how proven animal assisted learning strategies and techniques can be incorporated into our existing wellbeing and intervention programs. Belinda Rae (Assistant Principal) will be the designated primary handler who will be responsible for the housing and welfare of Rolo. Belinda will complete the required training and manage the dog when he is on school grounds.

5 tips to keep your family safe online



Parents and carers can use a combination of strategies to help young people build their digital technology skills and have safer experiences online.

1. Start the chat

Get into the habit of talking about online safety as a family, so your child feels comfortable coming to you if they ever need help working out an issue. It's never too early to introduce good online habits such as respect, empathy, critical thinking, responsible behaviour and resilience. As your child grows older, eSafety's advice about hard to have conversations will help with some of the tricky topics like sending nudes, online pornography and contact from sexual predators.

2. Create a family technology agreement

Creating a Family Technology Agreement can help you and your kids decide together when and how digital technology will be used at home. As a family, brainstorm easy-to-follow rules and display them where everyone will see them. Your agreement could cover things like: time limits, apps your kids are allowed to use and online behaviour. Families with younger children can download a template to guide the conversation.

3. Set up parental controls

Parental controls let you monitor and limit what your child sees and does online. It's best to use them in combination with the other online safety strategies listed here. Taming the technology can help you understand your options. Grab a device and get started with our guides to setting up parental controls on devices and accounts or in social media, games and apps.

4. Choose games and other apps carefully

Use eSafety's App checklist for parents to think about the positives and negatives when your child asks to download a new game or other app. The checklist covers things like age ratings, managing privacy settings and reporting abuse in-app. You can also use The eSafety guide to check and set up safety features with your child.


5. Use digital technology together

WARRIGAL GREENS TRIANGLES

INGREDIENTS

1/4 Cup of uncooked Warrigal Greens or spinach



1 sheet of Puff Pastry

2 shakes of salt and Pepper

1. Pre cook your Warrigal Greens by blanching in water or sauteeing in a pan. Chop them finely. Preheat your oven to 180 degrees (Fan)



2. Mix ricotta, cooked Warrigal Greens, salt and pepper together in a bowl.



- 3. Divide and cut your sheet of pastry into four quarters.
- 4. Divide your mixture into four.



- 5. Place 1/4 of the mixture onto 1/4 of the pastry.
- 6. Fold your pastry and filling into a triangle.



- 7. Place on a lined oven tray. Seal edges with fork. Spray with oil.
- 8. Cook for 20 minutes, or until golden.

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EVERY DAY COUNTS

Primary school attendance

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education.
Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

Why it's important

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day.

If students miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.

Getting in early

Attendance patterns are established early—a child regularly missing days in kindergarten or in the early years of school will often continue to miss classes in the later years, and receive lower test scores than their classmates. It's vital that students go to school every day—even in the early years of primary school.

What we can do

The main reasons for absence are:

Sickness – There are always times when students need to miss school, such as when they're ill. It's vital that they're only away on the days they are genuinely sick, and setting good sleep patterns, eating well and exercising regularly can make a big difference.

It's vital that holidays are planned during school holidays where possible, and not during the term if it can be avoided.

"Day off" – Think twice before letting your child have a "day off" as they could fall behind their classmates – every day counts.

Truancy – This is when students choose not to go to school without their parent's permission. There can be many reasons for truancy. The best way to address this is for schools and parents to work together.

If for any reason your child must miss school, there are things you can do with your school to ensure they don't fall behind:

 Speak with your classroom teacher and find out what work your child needs to do to keep up. Develop an absence learning plan with your teacher and ensure your child completes the plan.

Remember, every day counts. If your child must miss school, speak with your classroom teacher as early as possible.

Openly communicating with your child's school about all absences is a good way to prevent attendance issues being escalated to a School Attendance Officer. Attendence issues that are escalated can lead to an Infringement Notice.

If you're having attendance issues with your child, please let your classroom teacher know so we can work together to get your child to school every day.

ROAD SAFETY



Here at Newbury Primary School we take the safety of our students seriously. Please refer to the VicRoads information below and discuss with your children the importance of road safety.

Crossing the road safely

Pedestrians have to share the road with vehicles so it is important they take care when crossing the road. As a pedestrian, plan where you will walk and always choose the safest place to cross a road.

Stop, Look, Listen, Think

Follow the safe road crossing procedure - STOP, LOOK, LISTEN and THINK.

- STOP one step back from the kerb or shoulder of the road if there is no footpath.
- LOOK in all directions for approaching traffic.
- LISTEN in all directions for approaching traffic.
- THINK about whether it is safe to cross the road when the road is clear or all traffic has stopped.

When crossing, walk straight across the road. Keep LOOKING and LISTENING for traffic while crossing. This information is particularly relevant to young people learning to cross roads. But it also provides a useful reminder to everyone particularly to those who may be distracted when crossing the road.



Crossings

Even at crossings you still need to remain alert and check whether vehicles are stopping for you. Always make sure traffic has actually stopped before stepping onto the road.

Remember children's crossings are legally active only when the flags are displayed. If a school crossing supervisor is on duty, cross only when he or she indicates that it is safe.

Crossing the road at other places

- Walk straight across the road don't jay-walk.
- Keep checking in both directions to make sure the way is clear.
- Try not to cross the road from between parked cars or near trees and bushes as drivers may not see you.



- Avoid crossing near a bend or crest in the road. Give yourself a good chance to see vehicles coming from both directions.
- Avoid crossing on roundabouts, particularly multi-lane roundabouts as they are very busy and complex and cars are not required to give way to you, unless there is a pedestrian crossing. Find somewhere further away from the roundabout to safely cross the road.
